Summary of features of project and of its location indicating the need for EIA

The development is considered to be an urban development project approximately 5.62 hectares in size. The proposed development is above the indicative threshold set out in Schedule 2 of the EIA Regulations 2015.

Despite the area of the proposal the impact of the development is likely to be limited to the immediate locality and is not considered to have potential to lead to significant environmental effects.

With reference to Schedule 3 of the regulations and direction from the Secretary of State it is not considered that the site is a sensitive one, within the meaning of the regulations. Whilst there will undoubtedly be impacts arising from the development it is not considered that the environmental impacts would be of a magnitude which warrant an EIA as these impacts would be localised and can reasonably be considered as part of a normal planning application.
